A Prose:	

It was a pre3sent place perfectly accordant with men's nature –neither ghastly, hateful, nor ugly: neither common place, unmeaning, nor tame; but, like man, slighted and enduring, and withal singularly colossal and mysterious in its swarthy monotony. As with some persons who have long lived apart, solitude seemed to look out of its countenance. It had a lonely face, suggesting tragic possibilities.

This obscure, obsolete, superseded country fingers Domesday. Its condition is recorded therein as that of healthy, furzy, briary wilderness – 'Bruaria'.
